NBTC's FIRST WINTER MEETING: SARATOGA, JAN. 18, 1986

The Northeast Border Terrier Club will hold its first Winter Meeting, Afternoon BT Seminar, and Dinner at the Ramada Renaissance Hotel and Civic Center in Saratoga Springs, New York, on SATURDAY, JANUARY 18, 1986. The event will be held in conjunction with the Saratoga and Glens Falls K.C. AKC B-OB shows being presented at the site on Saturday, January 18, and on Sunday, January 19. Through the efforts of NBTC Vice President Nancy Hiscock, on-site grouped accommodations for NBTC members and their guests may be reserved at the Center's Ramada Renaissance Hotel.

Response to the planned NBTC meeting, afternoon seminars and afterdinner BT movies program is very enthusiastic already, Nancy noted. In addition to NBTC members, at least seven AKC Border Terrier judges have already indicated that they plan to attend. "By mid-January, we'll all be ready for a super BT get-together," Nancy said. "At the Saratoga NBTC Winter Meeting, we can learn a lot, we can show our BT's at two shows, and we can have a really good time. Let's just

hope the weather cooperates!"

Nancy also noted that entries for the January 18 and 19 shows close on January first, part of the Christmas holiday. It's vital to mail entries early because of holiday mail pressures. **Detailed JANUARY 18 and 19 AKC show information, accommodations information, and NBTC Winter Meeting program information appears on a later page of this issue of THE BORDER TIMES.**

NEW BUSINESS

1. Versatility Title

THE NBTC meeting at the Northwestern K.C. show in Goshen, Connecticut was called to order by president Jean Clark at 11.00 A.M. (after the Border judging).

Members present signed an attendance sheet for the club records, and all eight guests in attendance submitted applications for membership.

A motion was made, seconded, and carried to accept the minutes of the July meeting as they appeared in THE BORDER TIMES.

REPORTS OF OFFICERS AND COMMITTEES

Secretary/Treasurer's Report

Because the Secretary/Treasurer could not be present at this meeting, her report was not available. The president did say that NBTC is solvent and does not have any large bills outstanding.

NBTC Constitution Committee Report
Constitution Committee Chair Marg Pough reported that she has made a rough draft of a possible constitution for NBTC and hopes to have copies ready for distribution to members by November. She asked that anyone who has suggestions for the club constitution get in touch with her soon so that these may be considered before a draft constitution is mailed out.

Present planning is that the NBTC year run from May 1 to April 30. The president noted that we will need to have a nominating committee in place by January 1986 so that our first regular NBTC election can be held next spring.

Two papers presented at the meeting proposed that NBTC award a **Certificate of Versatility** to Border Terriers who have excelled in three of the four organized areas of dog competition--breed, field work, obedience, and tracking. The position of those interested in awarding the certificate was that since the BTCA already makes special recognition of obedience achievement and achievement in breeding (the Register of Merit), it is appropriate to recognize the special achievement of those Borders and their people who have excelled in the majority of the four recognized areas of dog competition.

The following motion was made, seconded, and passed:

That NBTC will award a Certificate of Versatility to any Border who gains three of the specified titles, one each from any three of the following four categories:

Certificate of Versatility Procedure:

The owner of a Border Terrier eligible for a Certificate of Versatility must send to the NBTC Secretary photocopies of **one specified title earned in three** of the four categories cited. On receipt of the photocopies, the Secretary will issue a signed and dated Certificate of Versatility. A list of Border Terriers awarded the

C.V. will be published in THE BORDER TIMES annually or more often.

2. Border Terrier Rescue Agency

A letter from a member suggesting the formation of a Border Terrier rescue agency was read. The discussion which followed reflected that members shared the writer's concern, but the majority felt that at the present time there is not sufficient need for the club to establish a formal rescue committee and procedures. It was noted that several members had on occasion taken in and helped to place Borders in need. It was felt that all members should be ready to help to the degree they could, since the club's purpose is to help the breed, and that such helping efforts as taking in and placing needy Borders not necessarily of one's own breeding are consistent with the club's purpose.

It was decided to make a brief statement of the NBTC position on this matter in every issue of THE BORDER TIMES, encouraging people aware of a Border in need to contact the Border's breeder first, then the Secretary of the NBTC and other BT breeders in the dog's area.

Members who can provide shelter for in-need Borders for a short period prior to the dog's permanent placement are asked to contact the Secretary with full information.

3. January BT seminar meeting

The possibility of holding an overnight BT seminar meeting in January was discussed. President Jean Clark handed out a sample schedule for such an event and presented the breakdown on prices if the Holiday Inn in Danbury were the site. (Cost = \$56 per couple per room, plus a \$250 fee for use of a

function room, plus meals cost).

Vice President Nancy Hiscock noted that two AKC shows are held in Saratoga Springs on the second weekend in January at the Ramada Inn Complex. She suggested that the NBTC seminar meeting could be held conveniently in connection with these shows, since NBTC activities as well as members' accommodations would be right at the show site. She volunteered to contact the Ramada concerning room fees and the availability and cost of a function room and dinner. (Details will be carried in THE BORDER TIMES). All present agreed that the Saratoga Springs plan would be excellent. It was suggested that the AKC slide show on the Border Terrier be shown at some time during the January weekend.

4. NBTC-supported entries

On the subject of NBTC-supported entries, president Jean Clark noted that according to AKC rules, at this time only the BTCA may officially support the BT entry at an AKC show. However, NBTC may offer trophies, and, of course, encourage members to enter particular shows. In order to make that encouragement reasonable, members were asked to suggest good BT judges' names to their local all-breed clubs.

Members were then asked to suggest shows at which NBTC might offer trophies in the coming year. As a result of discussion, **it was decided that in the coming year NBTC should offer trophies at Saratoga (if we meet there in January); at Windham County K.C. (May); at North Shore K.C. (June); and at Northwestern K.C. (September).** Suggestions for other shows to be "supported" by NBTC trophies and our strong attendance should be proposed at our 5.

As some of the members have gotten together this fall, several subjects came up which the club as a whole might want to discuss and decide on. For instance:

While in Pennsylvania, some of us found a very good motel within reasonable distance of both the Montgomery County K.C. and Devon Dog Show Association shows. It has good facilities for exercising the dogs and a good dining room. It was suggested that the NBTC should make a block reservation there for next fall. . . .

Now that the NBTC is awarding a Certificate of Versatility, some of us have become more aware of the T.D. (Tracking Dog) title, which counts toward the C.V. Few of us are familiar with the training that goes into earning the T.D., however, and several have expressed interest in learning more about it first-hand, possibly at an NBTC tracking clinic. I hope to have concrete info at our January meeting about the possibility. . . .

One of the members who attended the terrier trial in July the day before the Specialty has asked about the possibility of NBTC running a trial next year at the same place and date. I would be happy to chair such a trial but need some reliable workers for the day before the trial and on the trial day. We can discuss this at the January meeting and see if there are enough willing workers to make a July NBTC Terrier Trial an event we can all enjoy. . . .

Another member stated that she would like to see us offer trophies for Bred By Exhibitor Dog and Bitch at shows where we're offering prizes for Winners Dog and Bitch, Best of Breed, Best of Opposite Sex, and Highest Scoring Border in Trial. Her feeling was that the BBE class is the showcase for breeders and it would be nice to encourage it. . . .

One last item for your consideration--I think it would be nice for the NBTC to offer trophies at the October 1986 Montgomery County K.C. show (Pennsylvania). The BTCA supports the Border entry at that show, which usually attracts well over twenty Borders. . . .

These subjects will give us all things to think about for the January meeting. I hope you will attend and take part. Please bring up any other ideas you feel are important, too. . . See you all in January !

BREEDERS' NOTES

Airline Crate Uses After Whelping

Like Marg Pough, I use a # 200 airline crate as a whelping box. I was first attracted to it because of the easy way it can be cleaned up. I have some variations on Marg's uses which might be of interest.

I use a piece of cardboard cut to the size of the crate bottom and covered with papers for the whelping. Once the pups are born, I form a top over about one half of the crate bottom from a piece of old blanket held on with clothes pins. A day or two after the whelping, I remove and dispose of the cardboard and papers and make a new bottom surface. I sew a couple of pieces of blanket together as a fairly snug pillowcase for the pegboard crate bottom, making the blanketcase a bit longer than the pegboard so that it can be tucked under. I put a thin layer of newspaper between the blanketcase and the board to absorb the wet. When one side is dirty, I just flip it over to the clean side. This arrangement is warm for the pups, gives them traction, and because the case is a snug fit, it can't be rumbled into a corner.

Once the pups are about two weeks old and starting to totter about a bit, I fit the second half of the crate to the whelping box with the cut-down ends fitted together, squeezing one lip over the other and bracing the ends so the two pieces don't come apart. (The setup can be butted between a wall and a heavy chair or chest, for instance). This now double-sized area makes a nice safe place for the pups to play and sleep. The mother has easy access by jumping over the side. Leaving the blanketcase in one half and putting paper in the other makes it very easy to clean up.

At weaning time (about four weeks), I move the pups to a regular puppy pen, where they have much more room.

PRESS CLIPPINGS--EXCERPTS FROM HERE AND THERE

From "The Great Breeders" by Anne Roslin-Williams [DOG WORLD, 2/8/85]

Mrs Bertha Sullivan [Dandyhow Border Terriers] grew up with the breed. . . [and in 1950 purchased] . . . two bitches with a view to breeding. . . All subsequent Dandyhows carry a combination of the lines of . . . [these] two foundation bitches. Bint Superior was a daughter of a bitch which Mrs Sullivan liked called Dronfield Vixen and was sired by Ch Swallowfield Garry. The other bitch was Brins Selection, by Ch Tweedside Red Playboy ex Firefly. Mrs Sullivan decided that the only way to get type was by line-breeding. She admired Adam Forster's Ch Future Fame and decided to line-breed to him. Certainly this established a family likeness. . . At that time undershot mouths were a common fault in the breed and she has never bred from a dog with a bad or suspected mouth. The line is known for good mouths. . . [A serious blow to Mrs Sullivan was the death from distemper of the entire litter which Ch Bitter Shandy left behind when she was exported to the States, the disease being carried into the kennel by a Collie stray whom Mrs Sullivan sheltered]. . . The pride of the kennel undoubtedly was the great Ch Dandyhow Shady Knight, who won 24 CC's from 24 judges over a period of five years. He made breed history by being the first Border Terrier to win a terrier group at a championship show in Great Britain (1971). . . Shady Knight . . . [became] the leading sire of all time in the breed . . . his father Dandyhow Brussel Sprout [holding] that honour before him . . . That the strength of a kennel lies in its brood bitches has been proved by Ch Dandyhow Soraya breeding four champions, Cobette and Dandyhow Solitaire three each and Dandyhow Margery Goody Twoshoes of Dandyhow, Polo Mint, and Dandyhow Fly By Night two each. . . Polo Mint contains one of the few outcrosses brought into the line. Others carry Daetyne breeding. Ch Cravendale Copper (for coat and pelt) and Ch Duttonlea Suntan of Dandyhow (by Dandyhow Brigadier) were purchased from Mr Wilf Wrigley, bringing in fresh blood although they go back to Ch Future Fame. [Suntan was exported to Denmark, leaving behind] . . . a host of winners including three champions, one a group winner. His son Ch Uncle Walter of Dandyhow met an untimely end shortly after winning the CC at Crufts in 1984. His son Ch Dandyhow Crofter is the latest champion from the kennel, and his daughter, Dandyhow Sweet Hope, [is] the latest CC winner there. . . Other important exports include Ch Dandyhow Scotsman [to Norway]; Ch Dandyhow Forget-Me-Not to the States; Int Ch (FCI) Dandyhow Knight Errant [to Holland]; and Dandyhow Observer and Dandyhow Grenadier to Sweden. . . It is rare indeed to find a Border Terrier pedigree which does not contain the Dandyhow line, which has certainly been a major influence on the breed. . .

From Cornell University's **ANIMAL HEALTH NEWSLETTER**: Current research shows that castrating a dog in order to reduce mounting, urine spraying, aggression toward other dogs and other sex-related behavior problems is effective only about 50 to 60 per cent of the time. Use of the drug megestrol to control the same behaviors (plus excitability and destructiveness) has been shown in dogs to be 75 % effective for all types of symptoms, with 64 % of the animals maintaining their improvement three months after treatment. . . Thyroid gland deficiency, whose symptoms are fatigue, lethargy, weight gain, sensitivity to cold, and/or skin and coat ailments, responds quickly to the careful administration of thyroxine. . .

HANDY HINTS FROM BANDERSNATCH--Marg Pough

White vinegar is an excellent deodorizer for all sorts of doggy odor. Use it after cleaning up puppy accidents, when washing dog bedding and towels, when scrubbing out crates.

Chlorine Bleach (liquid) is an excellent disinfectant. Diluted 1 oz. bleach to 1 qt water, it will kill many common viruses--including distemper, parvo, & corona virus. Wash with detergent, then use bleach in the rinse water. Fill a spray bottle with 31-to 1 water-to-bleach for quick treatments.
