FROM THE EDITOR

Like a pair of pilgrims, we got our first look at the Scottish Borders while standing at the top of the Carter Bar, a gap in the barren hills which separate the English border country of Northumberland from Scotland. We had driven north, following Ronnie and Kate Irving home from the Driffield Agricultural Society's Championship Dog Show near Leeds. They led us through Redesdale and the North Tyne River valley. Ghosts of foxhounds and terriers were everywhere, for this land has been North Tyne hunt country since the 1720's. We passed just east of Hexham, then passed the town of Bellingham (both sites of shows with classes for Border Terriers in the late 19th C., before KC recognition) and along the Rede River to the Carter Bar. It looked to be paradise for fox, badger, and otter -- isolated, rolling moorland, with abundant moist rock crevices in which to hide. In swift pursuit of our ghost fox, we imagined our Border Terrier, clad in his thick jacket, ready to follow quarry to ground.



It was nearly dusk at the Carter Bar. We could feel frost hanging in the mist as it settled over the land. The land. We stared at the lay of the land, fields and rugged hills going away for miles, as if there might be some essential truth about Border Terriers evident in the panorama. Certainly there was magic in this land. Except for the Roman road on which we travelled, it appeared largely undeveloped, as it must have looked for centuries.

As we shivered, Ronnie pointed out landmarks for us: the Cheviot Hills rolling away to the east and the town of Kelso in the distance. It is there, at a fine, grassy site along the Tweed River, that the Border Union Agricultural Society holds its Championship Dog Show each spring. Ahead were the Black Hills, strangely rounded like ancient funerary mounds and to the west, Hawick (pronounced in one syllable: Hoyk) where on June 24, 1920 the Border Terrier Club was founded. North lay Jedburgh, a town with a beautiful ruined Abbey, but more importantly for our story, possessing a handsome stone Town Hall which is the home of The Border Terrier Club Open Show. We pictured Ronnie's grandfather Wattie Irving, Station Master at Riccarton Junction, Liddesdale Hunt country, travelling with his legendary Borders along rail lines connecting the towns below.

Names on the map became real places for us; something about the breed became more real, as well. From the perspective of the Carter Bar, far from the grooming and fuss of the show ring, Border Terriers appeared with all of the features that drew us to them in the first place: simple, healthy, tenacious, brown farm dogs, wearing wiry jackets and jaunty expressions. It is up to us to keep a memory of the land of their origin, so that we in turn may keep the essential dignity of the Border Terrier intact.

Finally, those of you who enjoy an occasional dinner at the home of member Kate Murphy will undoubtedly enjoy the following recipe from her personal file:

COOKED WOODCHUCK

Serves: 4

Prep Time: 1 hour

1 chuck, cut up	garlic powder
1 cup corn meal	3 onions
1 cup flour	1 stalk celery
1 egg	1/2 stick butter
1 c. water	cooking oil

Boil chuck with one onion and celery until tender. Cool meat and roll in flour until completely covered. Beat egg and one cup water together. Add seasonings to corn meal. Dip meat in egg/water mixture and then into corn meal until meat is completely coated. Cut remaining onions into thin slices. Melt butter in skillet and add onions, fry until tender. Move onion to side but not out of skillet. Add enough cooking oil to bring level of oil to 3/4 inch. Heat oil and add coated chuck. When coating is crisp on bottom side, turn chuck over and cut heat back to low or medium. Cover chuck with onions, cover pan and simmer for 15 minutes. Remove chuck and onions, salt and pepper to taste.

Bad Dogs

ELSABETH and Willard Pratt of Lewiston, Idaho, had to have their beloved 7-year-old German shepherd put to sleep in 1989. The animal suffered from degenerative myelopathy, a nervous system disease common to the breed.

The Pratts got another German shepherd puppy, only to lose it to epilepsy two years later. In November, they brought home a third, which, Mrs. Pratt said, was "an absolutely fantastic pup, smart, beautiful." It died of a bowel disease before it was 5 months old. The Pratts got

still another German shepherd puppy in March and are hoping for the best.

It's unclear how common this experience is, but many dog experts believe that the hereditary diseases and behavior problems afflicting the U.S. canine population have grown to epidemic proportions.

Pure-Bred Dog/American Kennel Gazette, a magazine of the American Kennel Club, has carried articles warning that pure-bred dogs face extinction because of genetically transmitted illness. More than 300 hereditary canine diseases are known, and about 10 new ones are discovered each year.

"We are in serious trouble," says Dr. W. Jean Dodds, a canine scientist and columnist for *DVM: The News-magazine of Veterinary Medicine*. "There is no question that all of the diseases we're studying are much more common than they were."

Some of the most popular breeds suffer most. Two-thirds of the nation's Doberman pinschers have von Willebrand's disease, a bleeding disorder. The Cocker spaniel, long the nation's most popular dog, is prone to serious eye maladies. So are Collies. In the 1980's, for reasons no one can explain, immune system diseases ap-

peared in more than 50 breeds.

Typically, popularity is the kiss of death for a dog breed. Indiscriminate breeding has caused dermatological problems in Chinese Shar-Peis, and Rottweilers, a "yuppie power dog" of the 1980's, often suffer from crippling muscle and skeleton problems.

A 1987 study by John C. Cargill, a veteran breeder, showed that 86 percent of the 2.4 million puppies eligible to be registered by the American Kennel Club, the country's largest registry for pure-bred dogs, were from breeds with serious genetic defects.

Most dog experts blame show dog and puppy breeders for this health crisis. The standards for show dogs emphasize beauty, not health. And because these animals are in high demand for breeding, the diseases they carry spread like wildfire. Puppy mills supply the nation's pet stores with an estimated half-million dogs annually. According to the American Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals, these commercial breeding operations are infamous for inhumane treatment of dogs and for producing unhealthy pets.

It is also possible that bad breeding is ruining the temperaments of dogs. Because of poor reporting, it's impossible to say if dog bites are more common than they used to be, but there is agreement that dog bite injuries have gotten worse. "We're certainly seeing more severe bites," said Gail Mackey, executive director of Spokanimal, an animal shelter in Spokane.

Paradoxically, these problems are occurring at a time when it's easier than ever to select and breed good dogs. With advances in molecular biology, it is now possible to track genetic ailments and then breed disease-free dogs. Similarly, improvements in the behavioral sciences have made it possible to screen a dog's personality before bringing it home.

A revolution is needed in the dog world. The American Kennel Club should refuse to register dogs carrying genetic diseases. Laws should be enacted to allow citizens to recover veterinary expenses from pet stores that sold them genetically ailing puppies.

But until these changes take place, prospective dog owners must educate themselves about the health trends in the breed they're interested in and seek out reputable breeders who offer

NABTW ACTIVITY WEEKEND

The consensus on the NABTW Working Terrier and Dachshund Activity Weekend seems to be small but successful, what the entry lacked in numbers was more than made up for by enthusiasm. Support came mainly from Dachshund and, not surprisingly, Border terrier owners, some coming from as far as Ithaca NY, and Lyndhurst NJ. Thanks to their participation and the generosity of our sponsors and donors, we made a small profit for the NABTW and had a trophy table to be proud of

The first event was the AWTA Den Trial, very ably judged by JoAnn Frier-Murza - There were two Border pups in Novice A, both of whom had read the paragraph about Borders being slow to enter, and they were not about to make liars of the experts. It was a different story in Novice B with two Borders qualifying - first place went to Badger, owned by Stacey Shaeen, with Marg Pough's Ferret finishing a close second. No Borders qualified in Open, but Ferret took home the trophy for Highest Scoring border in Open on the basis of speed to reach the quarry - now if only she would work them for the full minute! We figure Badger got to about fifteen feet, then came out for a flashlight! Certificate class belonged to the pros and the veterans, PC owned by Fred & Marnie Fielding was Highest Scoring Border with the veterans Pepper, Heather and Chip (combined ages 27) close behind.

In the Suitability Conformation, also judged by JoAnn, Bordeaux owned by Jocelyne Tasse-Durocher was pinned Best Terrier to Fox, while Ferret walked away with Best Border to Badger.

The racing was, of course, a riot. The course at 200ft was longer than usually seen at Terrier events and the very strong winds did create some problems by blowing the lure into the fence until innovation came to the rescue (you'll have to watch the video to find out how!). The Borders ran in the long-legged terrier events and the races were hotly contested despite the fact that there were several dogs who had never raced before, and the catching crew (some of whom were also first-timers) quickly learnt that the easiest way to get a Border to drop the lure is not to let him or her catch it in the first place! Jenny, as chief catcher, soon had the knack of snatching the lure as it came through the bales and chucking it over the fence - unfortunately at least one dog got wise and those at the finish end were treated to the spectacle of lure and pursuing Border sailing over the fence! The Argenson Classic for Long-legged Terriers on the Flat was won by Badger, in the Am Stram Gram Steeplechase for Long-legged Terriers over the jumps, Heather owned by Jenny Chambers prevailed.

Two Borders and a Dachshund were in very close contention for the Grand Champion award, and it seems only fitting that in the end it went to Ferret - congratulations Marg!
Within an hour of the Grand Champion Trophy being awarded, the garage had been transformed into a passable "restaurant" and the evening ended with a spaghetti supper.

The weekend wrapped up with the Agility Workshop, and Den trial and Racing Schooling sessions on the Sunday. Both activities were successful, the two Border pups participated in the schooling sessions and quickly found their niche - four-month old Tuxs really turned on to Den Trialing and Ziemo at five months of age has all the makings of a race winner. The Agility workshop finished with a demonstration by the participating dogs and it was hard to believe that some of them had set foot on the obstacles for the first time that morning, credit for their progress must go to Jenny Chambers who facilitated the workshop.

Because of the enthusiasm of the participants, and the feedback received subsequent to the weekend, next year's activities are already being planned, we look forward to seeing you on the 28th and 29th August 1993.

Old Business

Vice-president and Show Chairman Norm Baker reported on final plans for the upcoming 1992 BTCA National Specialty.

John Wyatt was thanked for his service to the club as Trophy Chairman. A new Trophy Committee was named: Jan Hewitt, Nancy Hiscock and Beverly Lapointe.

A discussion of BTCA supported entry shows for the 1993 calendar year followed (see list of shows, 7/11/92 minutes). These shows will be proposed to the BTCA membership at their AGM in PA next month. The BTCA, as an AKC member club, supports the shows in name only. The NBTC, as a non-AKC member club, can provide trophies but not support. Members unable to attend the BTCA annual meeting in PA might be interested to know that an inquiry was made on the floor concerning the large number of shows for which the NBTC requests support. It was stated that all of our supported shows draw majors (in some cases 4- and 5-point) in both dogs and matches. The conclusion seemed to be that we as a club are not supporting too many shows.

There now seems to be general agreement among NBTC members that we would like to have more input with shows on their selection of Border Terrier judges. If we are going to continue to support shows year after year, should we not at some point be part of the selection process?

We would like to begin to gather member's ideas on the following:

- By what process do you think we should gather members' opinions on judges? What is a fair way to reach a consensus?
- Should a list of recognized judges be circulated for the consideration of the membership?
- Would members like to submit confidential "short lists" of, say, 5 names or "long lists" of 10 names? These lists would be compiled and submitted to any show committee that requests or our agrees to accept input.
- Would it be feasible to vote for judges from a master list of all recognized AKC judges and compile a NBTC list of, say, 10-15 names that receive the greatest number of endorsements?

Both the Bryn Mawr KC show and the NCDC show have already tentatively agreed to have breed-specialist judges in 1993. In addition, Windham Co. KC has indicated its willingness to consider a list of judges for the 1994 show. However, the list must be submitted by December 15, 1992. Generally speaking, clubs select judges up to two years in advance. The results of our ideas would not therefore be felt for some time. Nevertheless, those who have felt discouraged by judges who do not seem to give Borders fair or interested consideration will agree that this is one way to try to improve the level of judging.
